PERIYAR E V Ramasamy (1879 - 1973) was a Tamil Indian social activist who championed rationalism, self-respect and women's rights, and in 1947 begged the British not to abandon Indians to perpetual slavery through independence.

He stated: 'Please continue to rule us, even if you have to do so from Britain, rather than abandoning us into the hands of the higher castes from whom freedom is

impossible.'
